General Election November 4, 2014

The general election is coming up in early November. Clark County is a vote by mail, so registered voters will receive ballots in mail in late October.

Voting is the most powerful way to have your voice heard and it is the foundation of our democracy. Study the candidates and issues on the ballot and exercise your right in vote.

Clark County Charter on Ballot in November

In November 2013, voters elected five county residents from each of the three Clark County Commissioner districts to serve as the Board of Freeholders. The 15 residents were sworn in and held their first meeting as the Board of Freeholders Nov. 26, 2013.

Between November 2013 and late May 2014, the Board of Freeholders drafted a home rule charter specifying a form of government for Clark County. By state law, a charter cannot apply to the Prosecuting Attorney, Sheriff's Office

or jurisdiction of Superior and District courts. Any proposed changes to the form or function of Clark County government must be within limits of the Washington State Constitution and federal laws.

The charter was approved by the board May 27, and is on the ballot for Clark County voters in the Nov. 4 general election. A charter becomes law if approved by a simple majority of voters.

NOW- Neighbors on Watch

Neighbors on Watch is a volunteer program for the Sheriff's Office that allows citizens to patrol in pairs, adding extra eyes and ears to the community. It is a high visibility, no confrontation program that requires a 24 hour training academy and a 10 hour mentoring period. Volunteers are asked to commit to four hours of service each month

Halloween Health and Safety Tips



Autumn holidays like Halloween and Harvest Day are fun times for children of all ages, who can dress up in costumes, enjoy parties, enjoy fall fruits and vegetables, and eat yummy treats. These celebrations also provide a chance to give out healthy snacks,

get physical activity, and focus on safety.

Check out these tips to help make the festivities fun and safe for trick-or-treaters and party guests.

Going trick-or-treating?

- **S**words, knives, and similar costume accessories should be short, soft, and flexible.
- **A**void trick-or-treating alone. Walk in groups or with a trusted adult.
- **F**asten reflective tape to costumes and bags to help drivers see you.
- **E**xamine all treats for choking hazards and tampering before eating them. Limit the amount of treats you eat.
- **H**old a flashlight while trick-or-treating to help you see and others see you. Always WALK and don't run from house to house.
- **A**lways test make-up in a small area first. Remove it before bedtime to prevent possible skin and eye irritation.
- **L**ook both ways before crossing the street. Use established crosswalks wherever possible.
- **L**ower your risk for serious eye injury by not wearing decorative contact lenses.
- **O**nly walk on sidewalks whenever possible, or on the far edge of the road facing traffic to stay safe.
- **W**ear well-fitting masks, costumes, and shoes to avoid blocked vision, trips, and falls.
- **E**at only factory-wrapped treats. Avoid eating homemade treats made by strangers.
- **E**nter homes only if you're with a trusted adult. Only visit well-lit houses. Don't stop at dark houses. Never accept rides from strangers.
- **N**ever walk near lit candles or luminaries. Be sure to wear flame-resistant costumes.

2016 Comprehensive Growth Management Plan update

Clark County is updating its Comprehensive Plan. The current plan, adopted in 2007, covers 2007 to 2024. The update will extend the current plan's growth outlook from 2015 to 2035. We expect to complete the update project in June 2016.

Updates will refresh policies and elements of the plan with an eye toward population and employment growth over the next 20 years.

Part of the comprehensive plan update requires the county to study land use alternatives (options) for accommodating the projected population and employment growth over a 20 year period.

Three proposed alternatives have been developed and are available for review. Find out what the proposed alternatives are, consider what they mean to you, and give us your feedback.

You can also attend one of the upcoming open houses to learn more about the alternatives and ask questions of staff.

Three alternatives represent the range of options currently being considered for the distribution of population, employment and development in the County over the next 20 years (2015-2035). The impacts of these alternatives will be studied and compared during the environmental review process required under the State Environmental Policy Act (SEPA).

In August, Clark County held Scoping open houses for the environmental review process. Information was presented on potential alternatives for the comprehensive plan update. With the feedback received in response to the Scoping open houses, there is now detailed information available on the alternatives.

Comments must be received by 5 p.m. Nov. 18 so the analysis work can begin on the Alternatives. There will be an additional comment period for the supplemental environmental impact statement (SEIS) when it's released in early 2015.

Tour Fruit Valley Community Learning Center and Peter S. Ogden Elementary School

On Friday, November 7, Vancouver Public Schools Superintendent Steve Webb will host his first patron tour of the 2014-2015 school year. The tour will provide an in-depth look at the dynamic learning opportunities at Fruit Valley Community Learning Center and Peter S. Ogden Elementary School.

Both schools will showcase applications of the district's strategic plan, Design II, and commitment to preparing students for college, careers and life. The tour of Fruit Valley Community Learning Center will highlight its Family-Community Resource Center, community partnerships and full-day kindergarten program. At Ogden, visitors will learn how an elementary school creates a culture of respect and caring by implementing clear behavioral expectations, bullying-prevention programs, social-emotional learning and academic interventions that increase student engagement and build positive relationships among students and staff.

Master Composter/Recycler Training and Workshops

Compost is rich in nutrients that help plants to grow, acts to retain soil moisture and can help suppress plant disease. Using compost is good for your soil and can reduce the need to irrigate your garden or use toxic herbicides or pesticides. It's easy to turn your yard debris and kitchen scraps into compost. Just as in nature, leaves and plant debris feed and enrich the soil, you can recycle the food scraps from your kitchen and yard debris back into your soil.

Learn how by attending a Free Backyard Composting Workshop, or Wormshop (\$35 materials fee). The Master Composter/Recycler Program is a volunteer-based community program whose mission is to educate the community about recycling and help keep recyclable materials out of the waste-stream.

Compost bins are for sale at Columbia Springs; the FreeGarden brand compost bin is \$55 and the Seattle Composter is \$65.

Wormshops

Participants will learn about the care and feeding of redworms for vermicomposting. Family Wormshop participants assemble their own worm bin to take home. (\$35 includes the cost of the workshop, bin and worms.) These workshops are family friendly. Pre-registration is required.

Crime Tips

Target Zero:

Washington State averages nearly 500 fatal traffic accidents every year. Target Zero is a project to reduce this number to zero by the year 2030. You can help towards this effort by not driving while under the influence of alcohol or drugs, not driving over the speed limit, wearing your seatbelt, and practicing defense driving habits. It is illegal in Washington State to use a handheld cell phone while driving unless you are contacting 911 for an emergency. It is also illegal to text while driving, which causes serious distractions.

Identity Theft:

Identify theft is a growing problem across the US. Criminals use personal information such as your date of birth and social security number to pose as you for illegal gains. You can protect yourself by not carrying important numbers or passwords with you. Report stolen credit cards immediately. Review your monthly financial statements and check your consumer credit report annually for fraudulent charges. Pick up your mail daily or have it held at the post office. Shred paperwork with your important information on it. Do not put your credit card number into unsecured websites.

Scams:

Scamming people out of money is very profitable for criminals. Many operate outside of US jurisdiction making it difficult to locate/prosecute them. Do not give personal information to any unsolicited phone calls or emails. Beware of emails and phone calls asking for financial help. Scammers will often pose as someone you know, such as a relative who is out of the country and needing money to get out of jail or back home. Never cash a check from an unknown source or send money orders as part of an "official procedure." Scammers send fraudulent checks which banks do not catch until days later, usually after the scammed person has already sent the requested amount back in a money order or gift card. It is illegal in Washington State to knowingly deposit a fraudulent check.
