competition to reduce their overall volume of waste and encourage recycling and waste reduction in their communities. The winner will be chosen based on weekly weigh-ins over a six-week period.




The 2013 winning household picked up enough tips during the competition to reduce its waste by 72 percent!

## Have you seen these weeds?

Japanese Knotweed is an invasive weed that is not native to Clark County. Since its inception in 2011, Clark Public Utilities' Eradication Nation has worked to stop its spread in Salmon Creek. Growing at a rate up to three inches per day this weed can grow up to 12 feet tall with stout



bamboo-like hollow stems. **It can push through building foundations and driveways, dominate native vegetation, and destroy fish and wildlife habitat.** In March and April, knotweed shoots look like asparagus. Keep an eye out for any fast-growing bamboo-like plants!



Japanese Knotweed spreads vegetatively from its roots, stems, and rhizomes that break off and are carried to other locations. A piece the size of your fingernail discarded into yard waste or floating down a stream can generate an entirely new infestation.



Garlic mustard is another invasive plant that displaces native vegetation. Thousands of tiny seeds per plant make it easy for garlic mustard to spread over forest understory. Contact the Invasive Species Coordinator for more information on proper removal methods.

Join us today and learn to identify these invasive plants, report sightings, and participate as a volunteer! If you believe you have Japanese knotweed on your property, do not hesitate to contact Eradication Nation and schedule a site visit. With the help of a grant from the Centennial Clean Water Fund, we can provide **FREE control of Japanese knotweed on properties in the Salmon Creek watershed.**

#### **Fire District #6**

Battalion Chief Todd Iremonger gave a very candid overview of what our local Fire Department does other than extinguishing fires.

A weekly program might cover: fire prevention education at the station or at schools; on-going training; responding to medical emergencies; youth Fire Cadet program; saving lives both human and animal; etc...

#### **Hazel Dell Boys & Girls Club**

Operations Director, Eric Kramer, introduced us to the Club and revealed that they are much more than an After School Child Care facility.

Their goal is to direct our youth to become well rounded future citizens. The Club offers a variety of guidance and leadership programs.

The February 18<sup>th</sup> meeting we had the Lions Club and SW Washington Humane Society.

#### **Hazel Dell Lions Club**

Lions Club member, Kathy Morrison, gave a detailed introduction and

### Emergency workers on the job in February's Big Snow

We all take for granted that Police/Fire/Emergency Medical/Corrections/Public Works will always be on the job whatever the conditions. But for most people, early February's big snow storm was just an opportunity to take an unscheduled holiday and stay home. But what about those other essential services where "not going to work" is just not an option? Local Search and Rescue groups have a long history of putting their time and talents to work for more than just looking for lost souls. That's why local SAR groups volunteered to transport doctors, lab tech's, nurses, cooks and custodians to and from area hospitals, all on their own dime and their own time! Who better? After all, you should see some of the terrain they traverse just to get to a remote SAR base camp. Snow covered pavement might be considered an improvement.



Our Clark County Sheriff's Office Civilian Search and Rescue Team logged nearly 1,500 miles making 46 transport trips day and night, during the storm, as far north as Castle Rock and east to Salmon Falls in Skamania County. One trip was to take a stranded patient home. She had come in to the ER via ambulance but was discharged at midnight with no way for friends or family to come pick her up. CCSO SAR delivered her safely back to her doorstep.

**Feral Cat Coalition**

The Feral Cat Coalition of Oregon is a trap-neuter-return (TNR) program for feral and stray cats living in Oregon. The goal of the program is to reduce suffering for existing feral cats and prevent the births and suffering of future generations. The program's services are targeted for feral cats who have caregivers feeding them. The caregivers trap the cats, bring them to a clinic, and return the cats to where they are being fed with a commitment to feed the cat(s) on a permanent basis.



FCCO's 24-foot mobile hospital, designed specifically for spaying/neutering feral cats, has three separate rooms: a surgery suite with room for three veterinarians to operate simultaneously; a prep area, complete with sink and autoclave; and also an anesthesia room. In addition to being spayed or neutered, each cat who participates in the program receives FVRCP (distemper) and rabies vaccines, is flea combed and sprayed, treated for ear mites and Ear tipother minor medical conditions and has his or her right ear tipped for future identification. Cats that appear to be suffering, as determined by a veterinarian, are tested for feline leukemia (FeLV) and feline immunodeficiency virus (FIV): all positives are euthanized.

FCCO also has a free-standing spay/neuter clinic in Portland in addition to our ongoing mobile program. The surgery suite has four surgery tables allowing us to have an additional doctor performing spays

thereby increasing our efficiency. This is an exciting step for our organization and the feral cats who need our services. The demand for our compassionate services outstrips our capacity in all the cities we serve.

FCCO is a 501c3 organization supported solely through donations. We do not receive any taxpayer support or other public funding. Please make a donation today and help keep us on the road to ending feral cat overpopulation in Oregon. This organization also serves Clark County, Washington.
