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INTRODUCTION

The Multnomah County Health Department and Cascade AIDS Project (CAP) provide this guide so that people living with HIV/AIDS can easily find the services they need. This guide is also for those who provide information and referral to HIV/AIDS services.

This guide covers Clackamas, Columbia, Multnomah, Washington, and Yamhill counties in Oregon, and Clark County in Washington. The information represents services available at the time the guide was revised. It's a good idea to call ahead to make sure that the services are still offered.

Most services are for low-income people and are free or low-cost, HIV/AIDS-specific, or HIV/AIDS-friendly. We do not list retailers, private practices, or professional offices (such as medical providers or counselors) unless they offer special discounts, services, or access to a limited resource.

HOW HIV/AIDS FUNDING WORKS

The Ryan White CARE Act

In 1990, the U.S. Congress created the Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS Resource Emergency Act, which provides money for the most urgent care needs of people living with HIV/AIDS. States receive some of this money as a block grant (Part B funds). More funds—called Ryan White Part A funds—are given to the hardest hit areas in the country. Clackamas, Columbia, Multnomah, Washington, and Yamhill counties in Oregon, and Clark County in Washington, make up a Part A area called the Portland Transitional Grant Area (or Portland TGA).

Ryan-White-funded services—Am I eligible?

Many Ryan-White-funded services are free or low cost. These services operate with very limited funds and are intended to provide assistance only after all other resources have been exhausted. Eligibility depends on the program. Some services are available for anyone living with HIV/AIDS. Others are only for those with low incomes or for those who are disabled by HIV/AIDS.

The symbol  is used to show agencies that receive Ryan White CARE Act funds to provide at least one service.

HIV case managers are your best resource for finding out what services you are eligible for. See Medical Case Management on page 4: This is a very important section to read. You can also call the agencies and ask what their eligibility requirements are.



HOW THIS GUIDE IS ORGANIZED

The agencies in this guide are organized by the kinds of services they provide. The Table of Contents lists service headings to help you locate the services you need.

What to look for in each entry

Use the information listed for each entry as a starting point. Each entry has the following information:

- agency name, address, and telephone number
- TDD/TTY numbers for hearing-impaired individuals
- Internet address
- brief description of the services offered
- availability of interpreters and/or bilingual staff
- availability of American Sign Language (ASL) interpreters

Hours of operation, cost, and other specifics are not always included because of frequent changes. Call each agency for details.

This volunteer citizen decision-making body sets funding priorities and allocates \$3 million in federal Ryan White CARE Act Part A funds for health care and support programs that serve low-income people living with HIV/AIDS in the Portland EMA. The council comprises consumers, care providers, and public health officials; at least 33% of the representatives must be people living with HIV/AIDS. Members must live in Clackamas, Columbia, Multnomah, Washington, or Yamhill counties in Oregon, or Clark County, Washington. Applications for membership are accepted year round. Meetings are held monthly and are open to the public. Call or visit the web site for the latest schedule.

RESOURCES FOR HEPATITIS C AND HIV-HCV COINFECTION

This guide includes resources for people with hepatitis C virus (HCV). Hepatitis C is a blood-borne virus that attacks the liver and is one of the most significant causes of chronic liver disease in the United States. According to Centers for Disease Control & Prevention estimates, over 4 million people in the United States are infected with HCV. Of those, one-quarter are also infected, or coinfecting, with HIV.

Hepatitis C can cause liver damage more quickly in individuals who are coinfecting with HIV. It can also affect HIV treatment. If you have HIV, it is important to know your HCV status early on. Hepatitis C is common among people infected with HIV who inject drugs, but you also can get it in other ways.

The Hepatitis C chapter at the end of this guide contains services especially for people with hepatitis C. Places that offer services for people with HIV also may have hepatitis C resources.

The  symbol is used throughout this guide to show agencies that provide at least one service for people with hepatitis C. Another way to find out about HCV services is to call the Oregon HIV/STD Hotline at 800-777-2437.



SERVICE ACCESS

MEDICAL CASE MANAGEMENT

If you have HIV/AIDS and need help, case management is a good place to start. Case management staff are your best resource for getting services. They can tell you about services and help you get connected. For people with complex needs, they can also:

- share their expertise in coordinating health benefits and meeting needs with limited resources
- offer you assistance and support if you run into problems applying for benefits or services
- evaluate your support systems and suggest ways to strengthen them

Case managers do not take over decision-making or do things for you that you could easily do yourself. They can save you time and hassle by directing you to available resources and helping you work through problems. If coordinating care is especially challenging (for example, for someone who is very ill, is experiencing mental illness, or does not speak English), a case manager can be very helpful. You do not have to be low-income to qualify for case management.

If you're already seeing a doctor, you may be able to get case management through your provider. There are HIV case management staff available at Kaiser, OHSU, Providence, Legacy, and Multnomah County Health Department's HIV Health Services Center.

GOVERNMENT BENEFITS

Government benefits cover basic needs such as medical care, insurance, and food for people who cannot support themselves. Meeting these basic needs puts you in a better position to focus on improving your health and support systems. It's worth checking to see if you can get these benefits. Case management staff can help you apply.

For additional basic needs programs, see **Basic Needs** section. The agencies in the Basic Needs section operate with limited funds and should be contacted only after you have checked out government benefits.

AM I ELIGIBLE?

Using the Internet, you can check to see whether you are eligible for government benefits before you apply. In some cases you may be able to download applications or apply for benefits online.

BIRTH CERTIFICATES

If you're applying for Medicaid, you may be asked to show a copy of your birth certificate. If you were born in the U.S., you can get your birth certificate from the vital records office (state, county, or city) for where you were born. A fee is charged, and there may be a wait.

FEDERAL

Medicaid & Medicare

Medicaid and Medicare are federally funded health insurance programs. Eligibility is determined by income level, duration and type of disability, and age.

Medicaid

Medicaid is jointly sponsored by state and federal governments and serves low-income people of all ages. Medicaid offers comprehensive medical care that includes doctor visits, hospital care, dental care, drug treatment, and some prescriptions. Oregon provides its Medicaid coverage through the Oregon Health Plan for individuals at or below 138% FPL. In Washington, if your income qualifies, you can apply for Medicaid at the Community Services Office near you or online at www.wahealthplanfinder.org You must be lawfully present in the U.S. and provide a valid Social Security number.

If you are receiving any amount of Supplemental Security Income (SSI), you are automatically eligible for Medicaid. If you stop receiving SSI (generally because you have begun to work), you will be "1619B eligible." This means that you may continue your Medicaid while you are working.

If you are disabled, you may be able to return to work and continue your Medicaid through the Ticket to Work, Employed Persons with Disabilities (Oregon), or Healthcare for Workers with Disabilities (Washington) programs.

CAWEM (Citizen Alien Waived Emergent Medical)

CAWEM is emergency medical coverage for non-citizens who do not meet the Medicaid immigration status requirements. Citizenship/immigration documentation is not required.

CAWEM Plus

CAWEM Plus provides additional benefits for pregnant CAWEM clients

Administration for Children and Families

Low Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP)

This federally funded emergency assistance program helps low-income people pay for heating bills during the winter. See the Financial Assistance section of this book for more information and to find an agency in your area that distributes LIEAP funds.

This USDA-funded program provides nutrition education, breast-feeding support, and food vouchers for low-income women who are pregnant or breast-feeding, and infants and children under 5. To be eligible, your household income must be less than 185% of the federal poverty level, and you must have a nutritional need. Call for a screening.

Medicare is offered through the Social Security Administration, and offers basic medical coverage to people over 65 and to some people with disabilities or kidney disease. Medicare is basic medical coverage and does not cover dental care or prescription drugs. If you have been receiving Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) for 2 years, you are eligible for Medicare. Prescription drug coverage is available by enrolling in a separate prescription drug plan called Medicare Part D. These plans have premiums and deductibles. If you cannot afford a drug plan, you can apply to have the premiums reduced. If you have HIV or AIDS and live in Oregon, you may qualify to have your premiums paid for through CareAssist.

The Social Security Administration (SSA) has two federally funded programs to provide disability income:

Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) is for disabled people who have worked and paid Social Security taxes.

Supplemental Security Income (SSI) is for people who are low-income and either blind, disabled, or over 65. SSI can supplement SSDI.

Once enrolled, you will receive checks every month for as long as you are eligible. If you become eligible for at least one dollar of SSI, you are “categorically eligible.” This means that you are eligible for food stamps and Medicaid. If you have been eligible for SSDI benefits for 2 years, you will be eligible for Medicare.



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If you apply for SSI, you may want to apply for General Assistance (see below) for income assistance while you wait for a decision on your application.

The Social Security Administration has a unique list of conditions that define what it means to be disabled with HIV/AIDS. You need more than an HIV or AIDS diagnosis to qualify. You must have a disability that will either prevent you from working for at least 12 months or result in death, and you cannot be eligible if the disability was caused by alcohol or drugs. You will want to ask your doctor for more information and help, or contact a case manager. Visit the SSA web site to download a copy of Social Security for People Living with HIV/AIDS, and Disability Benefits.

General Assistance

General Assistance is not currently available in Oregon or Washington.

Once on General Assistance, you will receive checks every month until you start to receive SSI. You also will get food stamps and medical coverage through Medicaid. Once you receive SSI, the total amount you received in General Assistance will be deducted from your SSI award. To apply, call or go to your local Community Services Office for a screening.

The Oregon Health Plan (OHP) provides comprehensive medical care and limited dental care coverage to low-income Oregonians through programs administered by the Division of Medical Assistance Programs (DMAP).

To learn more about enrollment call Cover Oregon at 1-855-CoverOR or visit CoverOregon.com. If you are already covered and have questions, call your health plan. If you still need help, call OHP Customer Service at 800-699-9075.

Coverage is available to people who earn up to 138 percent of federal poverty limit. Most people will receive their care through a coordinated care organization (CCO). Coordinated care organizations have been established to work for better health, better care and lower costs by focusing on prevention, chronic disease management, earlier interventions, and reduction of waste and inefficiency in the health system.

Coordinated care organizations are required to meet quality standards that are posted publicly



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four times a year. The Oregon Health Authority uses these standards to assess CCOs on how well they are doing in key areas such as access to care, prevention and health screenings, mental health care, among others.

Based on where you live you may have a choice of CCOs available in your county.

This state registry program allows Oregon residents to legally possess marijuana for personal medical use. Pain, nausea, and wasting are some of the HIV/AIDS symptoms that may be treatable with marijuana. To be eligible, you must have a qualifying medical condition and an Oregon Licenced physician must sign a written statement saying that marijuana may help. The Department of Human Services will then determine whether you can be approved for registration. There is a \$200 annual fee (\$60 with proof of Food Stamp benefits (SNAP), **or** \$50 with proof of Oregon Health Plan (OHP) eligibility, **or** \$20 with proof of receipt of Supplemental Security Income (SSI) monthly benefits, **or** \$20 with proof of receipt of compensation from the VA based on a finding of 100% service-connected disability **or** receipt of a needs-based pension from the VA as described in OAR 333-008-0020). Registration is also available for minors and caregivers.

This is not a prescription program. Distribution of marijuana is still illegal. The Department of Human Services does not provide marijuana nor a list of doctors willing to approve its use. Registered patients are permitted to grow a limited number of plants for their own use, with seeds obtained from other registered patients. How you can protect yourself and others...

There is no cure for HIV. If you are living with HIV, there are some important steps you can take to protect your health and the health of those around you:

Know your status. If you are unsure, get tested. HIV testing is available at a number of community test sites and through your doctor.

See a doctor. A doctor who specializes in HIV can tell you what medical care might help and what you can do to protect your health and quality of life.

Consider how you can reduce the chance of infecting others:

- Talk to your sex partner about your HIV status before having sex. Whether or not you are HIV-positive, don't rely on the other person to disclose.
- Develop a safer-sex plan. Using latex condoms and/or dental dams during anal, vaginal, and oral sex will greatly reduce the chance of giving or getting HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases. Safer-sex supplies are available at places that do HIV prevention work and at needle exchange sites.
 - Weigh risks and think about your choices. Having unprotected sex with new, multiple, or anonymous partners greatly increases your chance of giving or getting HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases.
 - Get screened and treated for sexually transmitted diseases (STDs) such as syphilis, gonorrhea, and chlamydia on a regular basis. These diseases make it easier to pass HIV, and are especially serious for people who have HIV.
 - Alcohol and drug use can increase risk-taking. Call the Alcohol & Drug Helpline at 503-244-1312 or 800-923-4357 to speak with someone about treatment.
 - If you are injecting drugs and can't stop using, you can reduce your risk for HIV and hepatitis C by getting sterile syringes and gear from a needle exchange site. You can also purchase syringes at pharmacies if you are at least 18 years old.
 - If you can't get sterile syringes, bleaching them will reduce—but not eliminate—the chance of giving or getting HIV and hepatitis C.

Confidential Testing

Confidential testing means that your test results become part of your medical file with your name attached, and you may ask for a copy of your results. Private doctors and public health clinics can provide confidential HIV testing as a part of your regular health care. County clinics may request a fee or donation, but no one is refused service if they cannot pay. For hepatitis C testing, look under **Hepatitis C Testing & Care**.

Rapid Testing

A standard HIV test is done using blood that is sent to a laboratory. Results are ready in about a week. With **rapid testing**, your results will be ready by the end of your visit. A rapid test maybe done with either blood or oral fluid, depending on the test. If the result is "reactive," this means you may be positive for HIV, but you will need to get a standard HIV test to confirm the result. County clinics sometimes offer rapid testing to people who are most at risk for HIV. Check the listings below to see if you are eligible.
